**S**tony Brook University Medical Center (SBUMC), a premier academic medical center, serves the health-care needs of Long Island residents. SBUMC is Suffolk County's only tertiary care center and Level 1 Trauma Center. The 571-bed Medical Center is fully accredited by The Joint Commission.

Together with the School of Medicine, Stony Brook is responsible for healing the sick, educating skilled healthcare professionals, uncovering the complexities of disease and discovering new treatments, and reaching out to the community to inform and teach. We fully embrace patient and family centered care, and consider our patients and families to be integral members of the healthcare team.

## PROGRAMS OF DISTINCTION

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- **The Cancer Center** provides advanced care with Disease Management Teams, a multidisciplinary approach, and participation in national clinical trials. Our facility for outpatient services houses the Imaging Center, Pain Management Center, and the Carol M. Baldwin Breast Care Center.
- **The Geriatric Program** provides comprehensive care for Long Island's aging population, including evaluation of patients living with common geriatric conditions. A team of experts develops plans of care with the aim of keeping patients as functional and independent for as long as possible.
- **The Heart Center** offers the only Open Heart Surgery Program in Suffolk County and is one of only ten accredited Chest Pain Centers in New York State. The Heart Center provides a central location where world-class physicians and specially trained staff deliver seamless care to cardiac patients.
- **The Institute for Advanced Neurosciences** plays a pivotal role in diagnosing and treating a full range of neurologic diseases and disorders including stroke, aneurysms, spine disease, Parkinson's disease, and many others, using advanced capabilities and sophisticated medical imaging technology.
- **The Level I Trauma Center**, the only such center in Suffolk County, provides patients with the highest level of trauma care in the region. Our physicians and nurses are specially trained in trauma and critical care patient management.
- **The Women and Children's Center** provides perinatal services, including advanced care for premature and critically ill babies in the Level III Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU).

## HOSPITAL ALLIANCES

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The alliances are part of an initiative to create a healthcare system in Suffolk County that would raise the quality of care for all residents, including those living on the East End of Long Island. To date, Stony Brook University Medical Center has formed alliances with Peconic Bay Medical Center, Southampton Hospital, and Eastern Long Island Hospital.

## PERFORMANCE INITIATIVES

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Stony Brook University Medical Center has participated in the Institute for Healthcare Improvement's (IHI's) "Saving 100,000 Lives" and the "Protect 5 Million Lives from Harm" campaigns, and continues to pursue the IHI's goals of:

- Instituting Rapid Response Teams
- Focusing on delivering reliable, evidence-based care for acute myocardial infarction
- Implementing a series of interdependent, scientifically grounded steps to prevent central line infections
- Implementing a series of interdependent, scientifically grounded steps to prevent ventilator-associated pneumonia
- Utilizing the National Surgical Quality Improvement Program to enhance performance to prevent surgical site infections

## POSITIVE OUTCOMES

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Stony Brook University Medical Center is actively working to become a high reliability organization (HRO)—an organization focused on getting it right with error-free operation over time. Many quality initiatives support this goal, and SBUMC has been recognized by a variety of organizations for quality excellence.

- **Early Sepsis Identification** Stony Brook was identified as a leader within New York State in the Surviving Sepsis Campaign. Survival rates for patients who arrive at SBUMC's Emergency Department with severe infections have improved by 36 percent from 2006 to 2009.
- **Mortality Rate Improvement** From 2003 to 2009, Stony Brook experienced a 17 percent decrease in the raw mortality rate. Over the same period, similar hospitals and academic medical centers in the University HealthSystem Consortium (UHC) had a 10 percent decrease in their mortality rates.
- **University HealthSystem Consortium Recognizes Stony Brook Mortality Rates in Several Areas** For the 12-month period ending June 2009, Stony Brook ranked in the top ten among UHC hospitals for the ratio of observed to expected mortality in the following areas: post-surgical, cardiothoracic surgery, gynecology/oncology, spinal surgery, and general surgery. Expected mortality takes into account medical problems a patient has at the time of admission in addition to the reason for the admission.

### MAJOR MODERNIZATION PROJECT (MMP)

The MMP helps ensure that Stony Brook continues to provide access to the latest medical advances and offer comfort and convenience to patients. Phase one, completed fall 2008, with 154,000 square feet of new construction and 48,000 square feet of renovation, included a new wing housing a Women and Children's Center, a state-of-the-art Surgical Suite, and an expanded Emergency Department. Phase two encompasses an additional 105,000 square feet, including a dedicated Pediatric Emergency Department (opened in November 2009), newly expanded space for the Comprehensive Psychiatric Emergency Program with separate areas for adults and children, a new Neonatal Intensive Care Unit, completion of the Labor and Delivery Unit, and completion of the main lobby.

## AWARDS AND HONORS

### CONSUMERS RANK SBUMC IN TOP 10 PERCENT

SBUMC received a 2009/2010 award where healthcare consumers determine the ranking of hospitals nationwide. SBUMC ranked in the top 10 percent, one of just 280 hospitals to receive the award, the result of a survey of 250,000 households.

### BEST DOCTORS

Eighteen SBUMC full-time and voluntary physicians were named to *New York Magazine's* 2009 Best Doctors list.

### DISTINGUISHED HOSPITAL AWARD FOR OVERALL CLINICAL EXCELLENCE

An independent rating company of hospitals and physicians designated SBUMC a "Distinguished Hospital" in its 2010 ratings. SBUMC excelled in the provision of care for women's health and cardiac and pulmonary conditions, being ranked #1 in New York State for Cardiac Services.

### DISTINGUISHED HOSPITAL AWARD FOR PATIENT SAFETY

An independent rating company of hospitals and physicians recognized SBUMC for its overall patient safety records, ranking it among the top 5 percent of hospitals in the nation, one of only eight hospitals selected within New York State.

### TOP 10 PERCENTILE FOR HANYS PINNACLE AWARDS

HANYS presented awards for safety achievement to SBUMC in "Reducing Complications in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit by Optimizing Nutrition and Growth" and "Increasing Detection and Standardizing Care for the Treatment of Severe Sepsis."

### EXCELLENCE IN PATIENT SAFETY AWARD

The Nassau-Suffolk Hospital Council presented SBUMC with its inaugural patient safety award for achievements in patient safety and quality improvement in decreasing sepsis mortality.

### STONY BROOK FIRST HOSPITAL NATIONWIDE TO SIGN GREEN AGREEMENT WITH EPA

Stony Brook University Hospital is the first hospital in the nation to sign a "green" agreement with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). Under the terms of the "Comprehensive Green Memorandum of Understanding," the institutions will work to mutually reduce the Hospital's environmental footprint. The agreement will lead to the implementation of various environmentally beneficial efforts including conserving energy and water, reducing waste, and increasing the use of environmentally friendly products throughout the Hospital.

### PARTNER FOR CHANGE AWARD

SBUMC is one of only two hospitals in New York State to receive the "Environmental Excellence Award" from Practice Greenhealth for 2008 and 2009 for transforming operations and improving the environment in a cost conscious manner.

### SBUMC'S TRAUMA SERVICE IS IN THE TOP FOUR PERCENT OF TRAUMA CENTERS NATIONWIDE

According to the report "Survival Measurement and Reporting Trial for Trauma" by the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality, SBUMC's Trauma Service ranks in the top four percent nationwide, with the lowest mortality for victims of injury.

### EMERGENCY DEPARTMENT SELECTED FOR "URGENT MATTERS" INITIATIVE

SBUMC has been selected to participate in the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation "Urgent Matters" initiative dedicated to finding, developing, and measuring the effectiveness of strategies to improve patient flow and reduce ED crowding. SBUMC will collaborate with five other hospitals through a "learning network" structure to test new ideas, quantify results, and share lessons learned. Stony Brook identified three areas of focus for the initiative, including electronic ED consults, abdominal pain protocol, and the CTA protocol. Program successes will be shared nationwide, giving other hospitals and stakeholders concrete and tested examples of effective, promising practices and interventions that they can adopt in their own EDs.

### AMERICAN COLLEGE OF SURGEONS COMMISSION ON CANCER OUTSTANDING ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

SBUMC's Cancer Services program received the 2008 American College of Surgeons Commission on Cancer Outstanding Achievement Award. This award is designed to recognize cancer programs that strive for excellence in providing quality care to patients with cancer.

### CORONARY INTERVENTION EXCELLENCE AWARD

An independent healthcare ratings organization recognized the caliber of cardiac care provided by SBUMC compared to all other hospitals in the nation.

### SBUMC DESIGNATED A UNITEDHEALTH PREMIUM® CARDIAC SPECIALTY CENTER FROM 2007 TO 2009

SBUMC has been designated a UnitedHealth Premium Cardiac Specialty Center from 2007 to 2009. UnitedHealthcare developed the designation to give its members information about hospitals that meet rigorous quality criteria.

## AWARDS AND HONORS

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### **LONG ISLAND BUSINESS NEWS “ACHIEVEMENTS IN HEALTHCARE” AWARD**

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SBUMC’s “Code H Lifesaving Initiative Team” was recognized for reducing door-to-balloon catheterization time to 71 minutes—well below the American College of Cardiology and American Heart Association guidelines of 90 minutes.

### **“GET WITH THE GUIDELINES—STROKE” PROGRAM**

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The American Heart Association/American Stroke Association recognized SBUMC with its “Get With The Guidelines–Stroke” (GWTG-Stroke) Bronze Achievement Award. The award acknowledges the Medical Center’s ability to achieve 85 percent adherence to the GWTG-Stroke Performance Measures and Guidelines for 90 consecutive days and demonstrates continued commitment to quality—a commitment that benefits the patients and caregivers who come to SBUMC seeking stroke treatment.

### **GASTROENTEROLOGY IS RANKED AMONG NATION’S BEST**

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*U.S. News & World Report’s* “2010-11 Best Hospitals” issue ranks Stony Brook Gastroenterology among the top 50 in America. With this ranking, Stony Brook joins an elite group of only 152 medical centers nationwide in 16 specialties.

### **KIDNEY TRANSPLANTATION SERVICE AWARDS**

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SBUMC’s Kidney Transplantation Service received a “Referral to Listing Award” for significant decrease in the median referral to listing time from a high of 394 days in June 2007 to 45 days in August 2008. It also received the “Transplant Volume Award” as one of only five centers in the country to achieve a greater than 20 percent increase in volume of deceased donor transplants, and is one of only seven centers to receive the Transplant Growth and Management “Overall Achievement Award.” The Transplantation Service reached its milestone of the 1,000th kidney transplant in 2008.

### **U.S. HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES ORGAN DONOR SILVER MEDAL OF HONOR**

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SBUMC was awarded a Silver Medal of Honor by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services for its success in increasing the number of organs available for transplantation and recognizing the Hospital’s achievement of a 75 percent conversion rate plus an average of 3.75 or more organs transplanted per donor over the past 12 months. SBUMC is one of only seven hospitals in the region and the only one on Long Island to be presented with this prestigious award.

### **NATIONAL ACCREDITATION FOR CAROL M. BALDWIN BREAST CARE CENTER**

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The Carol M. Baldwin Breast Care Center was granted three-year/full accreditation by the National Accreditation Program for Breast Centers—the first breast center in New York State to receive such accreditation.

### **ORTHOPAEDIC RESEARCH AND EDUCATION FOUNDATION CLINICAL RESEARCH AWARD**

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A team of SBUMC researchers received the prestigious 2009 Orthopaedic Research and Education Foundation/Kappa Delta Sorority/American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons “Clinical Research Award” for the work they have done in the use of collagenase in treating Dupuytren’s contracture and the use of collagenase for the treatment of frozen shoulder.

### **PALLIATIVE CARE LEADERSHIP AWARD**

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The National Consensus Project (NCP) selected SBUMC’s palliative care program, Survivorship and Supportive Care, recipient of its 2009 Palliative Care Leadership Award. The program is one of nine programs in the country selected for this award.

### **“ADVANCE FOR NURSES” SECOND ANNUAL READERS CHOICE AWARDS**

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In the October 13, 2008 edition of *Advance for Nurses*, SBUMC received four out of five “top picks” for nurses. The Medical Center excelled as one of the region’s best for nursing practice in the areas of quality, professional development, organizational culture, and retention.

### **RECOGNITION FOR BLOOD DONATIONS**

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SBUMC was recognized for its efforts in sponsoring blood drives and collecting blood donations with an Award for Blood Donations from the Long Island Blood Services, a division of the New York Blood Center.

### **“MOST WIRED” SURVEY’S MOST IMPROVED AWARD**

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SBUMC received “Most Wired” Survey’s 2009 “Most Improved Award,” sponsored by *Hospitals and Health Networks*.

### **INNOVATION AWARD FOR FOOD SERVICES**

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The National Society for Healthcare Foodservice Management (HFM) recognized SBUMC’s Food and Nutrition Services with its “Spotlight on Innovation Award” for contributions to the healthcare foodservice field and its role in reducing the carbon footprint of foodservice operations.
